Activity 1: Online relationships

- Look at the quotes on the next page. These are all things young people said when we asked them about chatting online.
- For each quote, circle a box to show if you think it highlights a positive or negative aspect of chatting online or if you think it depends.
- For each quote, write down the reasons for your answer. If you know a friend who is also doing this exercise at home, compare your reasons. If they have a different view, have a debate!
- Read the article 'Selfies: the naked truth' on the 14+ Thinkuknow website <u>www.thinkuknow.co.uk/14 plus/Need-advice/Selfies-and-sexting/</u>. The beginning of the article offers advice to young people who have been asked for a nude but feel uncomfortable sending one it's called 'Three ways to say no'.
- One of the suggestions is to use the 'Zip It' app which offers memes young people can use to help them say no if someone is pressuring them to send a nude. Download the ZipIt app on your phone and pick your favourite meme. If you don't want to download the app, you can search for them on google images.
- **Optional extension:** design your own Zipit meme! If you feel comfortable doing so, share the Zipit app and your new meme with your friends.

Activity 2: When nudes get shared around

- Sometimes, nude images can be shared amongst friendship groups or in schools. Read the article 'When nudes get shared around' on the Thinkuknow website – www.thinkuknow.co.uk/14 plus/Need-advice/when-nudes-get-shared-around.
- The article contains suggestions for young people on what to do if they witness someone else's nude images being shared without that person's knowledge or permission. These suggestions are all examples of being a 'positive bystander' – for example not joining in when you witness abuse, or helping the victim.

When nudes get shared around: a case study (activity 2)
